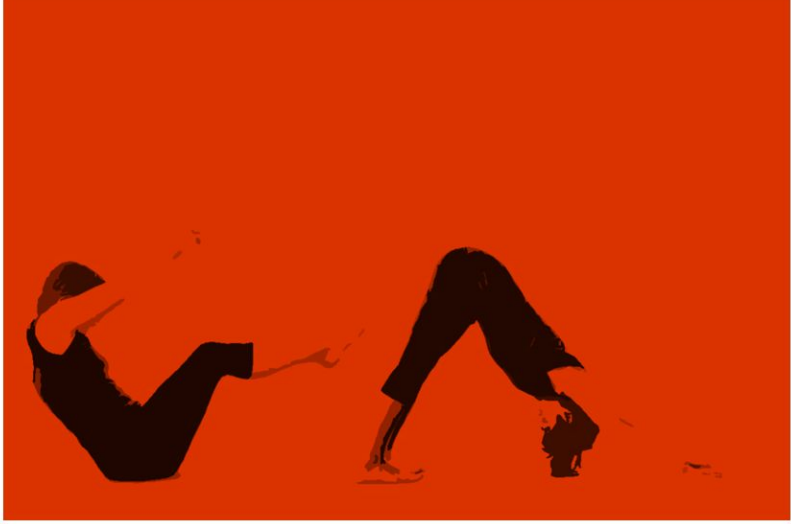

Discussion Forum

The Library will host Bowdoin Professor Kristen Ghodsee in the historic Reading Room of the library on Tuesday, January 22 at 6:30pm. Ghodsee's new book "Lost in Transition" examines post-communism life in Eastern Europe.

Ghodsee, who earned her Ph.D. at UC Berkeley, will lead a discussion on the gendered effects of the economic transition from communism to capitalism and the ethnographic study of post-communist nostalgia in Eastern Europe. Ghodsee has spent over fifteen years examining the impacts of the transition process on the lives of ordinary men and women, and provides intimate narratives and images of the impacts of the collapse of communism on daily life.

Featured recently on MPBN's "Maine Calling," Ghodsee's research in Eastern Europe has been supported by the National Science Foundation and the Fulbright Foundation among others. Ghodsee is the author of four books and over two dozen articles, and has won the Barbara Heldt Book Prize, John D. Bell Book Prize, Harvard Davis Center Book Prize, and the William Douglass Book Prize.

We Recommend: Quiet by Susan Cain

Former lawyer Susan Cain left the corporate grind to pen a book about the flourishing inner life. A self-professed introvert who prefers a quiet one-on-one conversation to a noisy, crowded party, the debut writer presents her research, and a rallying call to action in *Quiet: The Power of Introverts in a World That Can't Stop Talking*. This nonfiction work explains how our culture has come to favor extroverts, but Cain insists that introverts should not feel a need to change their inherent personality traits. She explores some of the unsung ways that introverts have shaped the world, extolling the virtues of their quiet power.

Cain brings together a fascinating collection of studies and anecdotes to analyze how introverts differ from extroverts. For example, the two types process dopamine differently, with extroverts exhibiting a greater response to it. As a result, they are often more likely to do riskier things in search of greater rewards, while introverts are more likely to analyze the results of their actions and avoid risky activities.

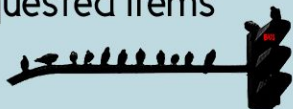
