

NEW BOOK AT THE LIBRARY: Bad Pirate by Kari-Lynn Winters



Smart pacing and playful art tell the tale of a pirate too doggone loyal for her own good. Capt. Barnacle Garrick may be the scurviest mutt to sail the seven seas, but his blue-eyed daughter Augusta is kind, considerate, and caring. In short, she's a very bad pirate. The story is so packed with pirate jargon and growls that even the most staid and sorry landlubbers will become salty dogs while reading. It's Griffiths' art that takes the wave-swept narrative to another level. Augusta's charm goes far, and each breed of canine is rendered with a loving hand. Even more delightful are the tiny details: from Augusta's surreptitious carving of a new peg leg to Garrick's battles with uniformed mice in an early vignette, young readers will see something new with each turn of the page.

Arrrrguably the best piratical dogfight you'll ever sink your teeth into.


New Title to Recommend

Where They Found Her by Kimberly McCreight Review by: Katherine Webber

"Where They Found Her" is a provocative thriller told through the alternating perspectives of three women in the town of Ridgedale, New Jersey. After an early morning call about the discovery of an infant's body, newspaper reporter Molly Sanderson (dealing with emotional trauma and getting her life on track) is swept into the events surrounding the potential murder of the infant. Meanwhile, 16-year-old Sandy, a high school dropout, whose own problems entail a missing mother, eviction, and avoiding police, is trying to get her GED and help pay the rent. Finally, local concerned citizen Barbara struggles to makes sense of her seemingly idyllic children, while coming to grips with the horrors of reality. The mistakes of the past come back to haunt each of these women and their lives are thrust together in unexpected and tangled ways. The plot twists keep you guessing until the final pages, and the book is presented in traditional prose, diary entries and newspaper articles that keep the story alive and full. For readers who enjoyed 'Gone Girl,' 'Luckiest Girl Alive," or "The Girl on the Train," this book is sure to tickle your creep factor and you'll marvel at the things these *ordinary* people have to hide.

NEW BOOK AT THE LIBRARY: Purity by Jonathan Franzen


Purity "Pip" Tyler, the hero of Franzen's fifth novel, is a bright college grad with limited prospects: burdened with student debt, she lives in an Oakland squat, makes cold calls at a go-nowhere job, and can't stray far from an emotionally needy mom who won't reveal who her dad is. A German visitor, Annagret, encourages Purity to intern in Bolivia for the Sunlight Project, a WikiLeaks-style hacker group headed by the charismatic Andreas Wolf. Franzen burrows deep into each person's questionable sense of goodness and suggests that the moral rot can metastasize to the levels of corporations and government. The novel's prose never bogs down into lectures, and its various back stories are as forceful as the main tale of Purity's fate. An expansive, brainy, yet inviting novel that leaves few foibles unexplored.

NEW BOOK AT THE LIBRARY: Girl Waits with Gun

Better known for her nonfiction, Stewart crafts a solid, absorbing novel based on real-life events. Constance Kopp and her sisters, Norma and Fleurette, are driving into Paterson, New Jersey, on a summer day in 1914 when a motor car rams them, splintering their buggy and mildly injuring all three women and their horse. Drunken lout Henry Kaufman thinks that owning a local silk manufacturer entitles him to ignore Constance's reasonable request that he pay for the damages, but he's misjudged his opponent. As Constance's first-person narrative unfolds, we see that she's a bold woman unafraid to defy convention, determined to see justice done and to protect her family. Stewart deftly tangles and then unwinds a complicated plot with nice period detail, and the real interest here is rooting for Constance as she refuses to be HACKENSACK, N.J., Nov 22- Miss Constance Kopp, who has been



patronized or reduced to a dependent of her brother. A final scene offers well-deserved new horizons for Constance and hints a series may be in the works. More adventures involving gutsy Constance, quietly determined Sheriff Heath, and a lively cast of supporting characters would be most welcome.



NEW DVD AT THE LIBRARY: Inherent Vice directed by Paul Thomas Anderson

In 'Inherent Vice,' director Paul Thomas Anderson, whose previous explorations of places and people in time include "There Will Be Blood," "Boogie Nights" and 'Magnolia,' presents a dreamy trip to the end of the 1960s. Based on the Thomas Pynchon novel of the same name and thick with colorful characters, the story mashes together classic film noir and '60s psychedelica' into a dense, frothy, enjoyable cinema excursion. The film features private eye Doc Sportello (Joaquin Phoenix) on a mission of LA noir intrigue, double-crosses, and homicidal mayhem. For the die-hard noir lovers, this is a tough but ultimately rewarding film to watch. Ignore the over-used tropes and hackneyed clichés and appreciate the mood and setting of the story.
