

My Top 5 Books of 2014




- 5. The Children Act by lan McEwan. A High Court judge, Fiona Maye, finds her marriage disintegrating at the same time that she must try the most difficult proceedings of her career as a magistrate. A seventeen year old musical prodigy named Adam, a Jehovah's Witness, is refusing medical treatment on religious grounds. A powerful and controversial topic that is given a rich and layered treatment at the impeccable pen of lan McEwan.
- 4. The Assassination of Margaret Thatcher by Hilary Mantel. Two time winner of the Booker Prize, Mantel turns her attention to the short story in this flawless collection. With elegantly drawn situations, intriguing characters, and some great surprise endings, it impressed me thoroughly in terms of both style and content.
- 3. The Arsonist by Sue Miller. This book was underrated by the critics in my opinion. Frankie returns home to New Hampshire after several years of relief work in Africa. Someone is setting fire to the homes of the summer people in the small town to which her parents have retired. Frankie starts an affair with the local newspaper reporter, as they try to track down the arsonist. Meanwhile, her father is sinking into the horrors of dementia, and her mother can no longer deal with him. Miller touches expertly on class warfare and the battle between the haves and have nots. The book fell flat for some readers. Several complained that Miller didn't wrap up the loose ends. I say, that's how life is.
- 2. The Snow Queen by Michael Cunningham. The story of four misfits in Manhattan: two thirtysomething brothers, a spunky middle aged shop owner, and a dying bride. I feel like Michael Cunningham understands who I am. I love his writing and his characters so very much; I feel their pain rather deeply. Another one that was overlooked by the critics in this busy year for books.
- 1. Euphoria by Lily King. This one was NOT overlooked! It's been on most of the critics' lists, and our own Maine gem Lily King won the first annual Kirkus Literary Prize for Fiction and 50,000 dollars with it. Based loosely on the life of legendary anthropologist Margaret Mead, the prose in Euphoria is cut like a diamond and sparkles just as brightly. Make no mistake, this is an unabashed love story as much as a historical novel, and what a tragic one it is. The ending will crush you, absolutely break your heart, and as for that final sentence: unbeatable. Fiction doesn't get any better than this. Recommended to all without reservation.

The library will host award winning writer and photographer Helen Peppe on Tuesday, January 13 at 6:30pm. All library events are being held at the temporary library location on the first floor of the Winthrop Commerce Center at 149 Main Street during construction of the addition to the historic Bowdoin Street building.

Helen's photography and written work have received numerous awards and recognition, including placing first in the 2009 Word Worth Essay and Fiction Contest, and The Starving Writer Literary contest twice. She was one of seven finalists for the 2011 Annie Dillard Creative Nonfiction Award, as well as a Maine Literary Award repeat finalist. She has an M.F.A. in creative writing from the Stonecoast Low-Residency MFA program at the University of Southern Maine, where she returns as an alumna to teach and photograph. Helen's new memoir, "Pigs Can't Swim," is a 2014 Indie Next List title. She is currently working on a teen novel and her second memoir, "Chasing the Light," which focuses on photography.
