New Download Library

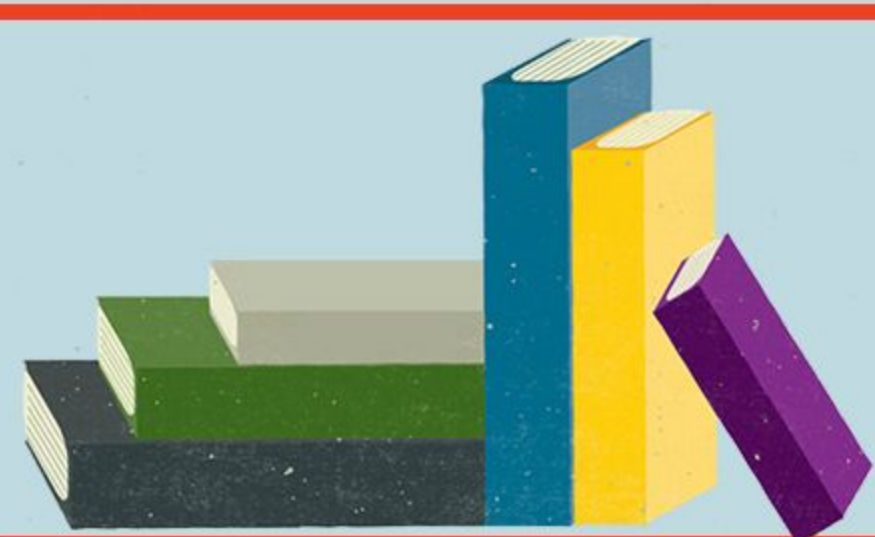


On March 1, our Download Library service moved to a brand new eBook and downloadable Audiobook platform called cloudLibrary. This has replaced the Overdrive platform.

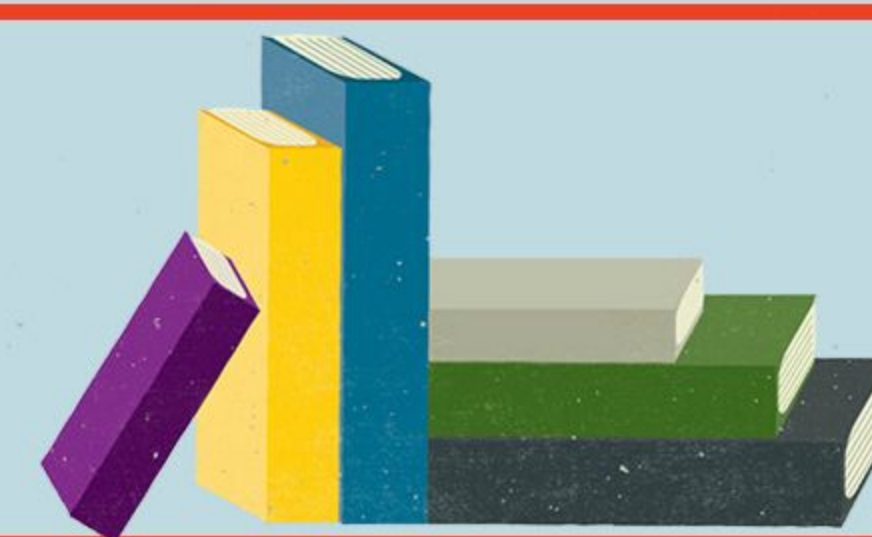
To use the new system, simply download the app for your device by going to: yourcloudlibrary.com and selecting United States, Maine, and Winthrop. You can also open the Apple App Store (on Apple devices) or the Google Play Store (on Android devices) and search for cloudLibrary.

With this transition to the cloudLibrary, the Download Library will continue to offer our members over 10,000 digital titles, plus new titles and additional copies of popular titles.

NEW BOOK COMING SOON: *Anything Is Possible* by Elizabeth Strout

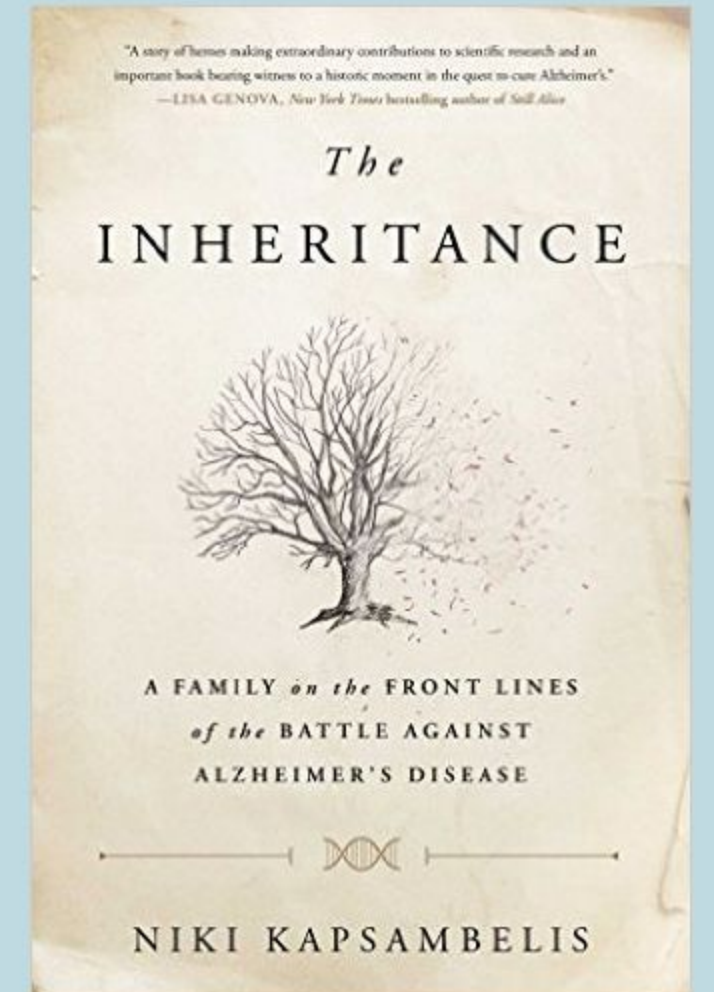
A radiant collection of stories linked to Strout's previous novel, "My Name Is Lucy Barton," but moving beyond its first-person narration to depict small-town life from multiple perspectives. Lucy is long gone from Amgash, Illinois, but her absence looms large; now that she's a well-known author, the fact that her desperately poor family was despised and outcast has become an uncomfortable memory for the locals. Class prejudice remains one of Strout's enduring themes, along with the complex, fraught bonds of family across the generations, and she investigates both with tender yet tough-minded compassion for even the most repulsive characters. Another powerful examination of painfully human ambiguities and ambivalences –this gifted writer just keeps getting better.

Debut Author Spotlight: Niki Kapsambelis

NEW BOOK AT THE LIBRARY: The Inheritance by Niki Kapsambelis

In her debut, journalist Kapsambelis builds a compelling narrative about Alzheimer's disease around one North Dakota extended family. In sections alternating among sagas of specific families, research in medical laboratories, and sweeping explanations of dementia, the author demonstrates beyond doubt that although Alzheimer's acquired its name in the early 20th century (first described by Alois Alzheimer in 1906), it has devastated human brains for thousands of years. Much of what used to pass for old-age senility has actually been virulent dementia, of which Alzheimer's is a specific type. Kapsambelis focuses largely on early-onset Alzheimer's, which sometimes manifests as early as age 35. By focusing on the DeMoe family of rural North Dakota, the author was able to spend time with family members while they were still lucid. In addition to clear discussions of the disease's history and research, Kapsambelis successfully portrays Gail, Galen, and their extended family as fully fleshed individuals. An educational and emotional chronicle that should resonate with a wide variety of readers.

In this gripping sci-fi drama, adapted from the relatively unknown short story "Story of Your Life" by Ted Chiang, Amy Adams plays Dr. Louise Banks, a prominent linguist, who is recruited by the government to attempt communication with extra-terrestrials. They have arrived on Earth or, rather, are hovering above it in twelve spacecrafts. Director Denis Villeneuve proves again (right on the heels of the stunning "Sicario") that he's a master of his craft, and Adams anchors the film with one of her smartest performances to date. There are few actresses working today with the vast range Adams possesses. "Arrival" is an unusual film in that its slow-burn build enraptures the audience in ways it didn't realize it wanted.

Lakes Region Forum: Bo Jespersen

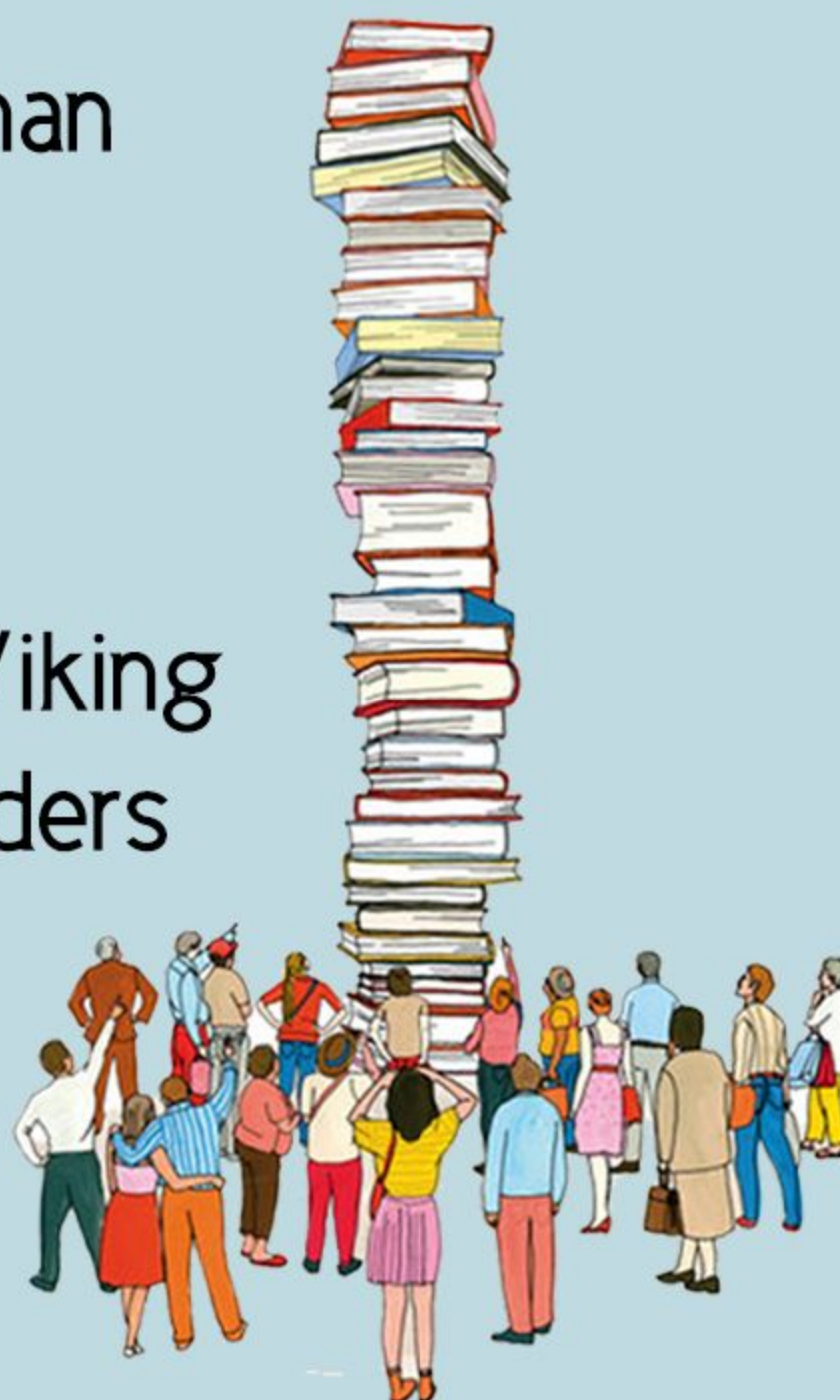


The library will host Bo Jespersen, owner of The Breathable Home, an energy auditing and weatherization business on Tuesday, March 21st at 6:30pm. The discussion will focus on the philosophy and science of home performance, as well as different aspects of home weatherization. The talk is part of the ongoing Winthrop Lakes Region Forum sponsored by the Winthrop Public Library Foundation. Jespersen started working in residential construction in 1998 and established his own company in 2004. After attending a building science course in 2007, he now focuses exclusively on home weatherization. Jespersen will discuss the process of home insulation, high density spray foam, crawlspace encapsulations and air source heat pumps, as well as answer specific questions about heating, basements, attics and windows. In 2012, Bo was awarded the Contractor of the Year award from Efficiency Maine for completing the most PACE loan funded weatherization jobs in Maine. He is an Efficiency Qualified Maine Energy Advisor and a state licensed Oil Limited Energy Auditor Technician. He holds several certifications and is affiliated with numerous energy related organizations. Jespersen performs between 80-100 residential home energy upgrades per year.
