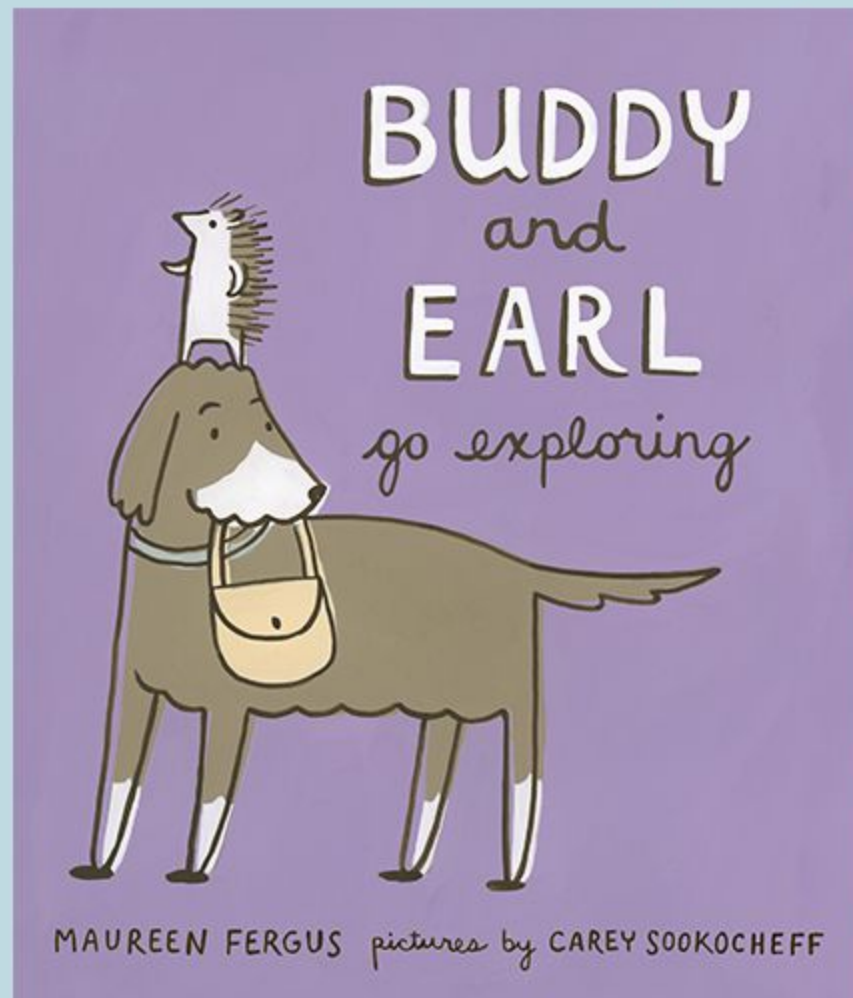

Buddy and Earl Go Exploring by Maureen Fergus

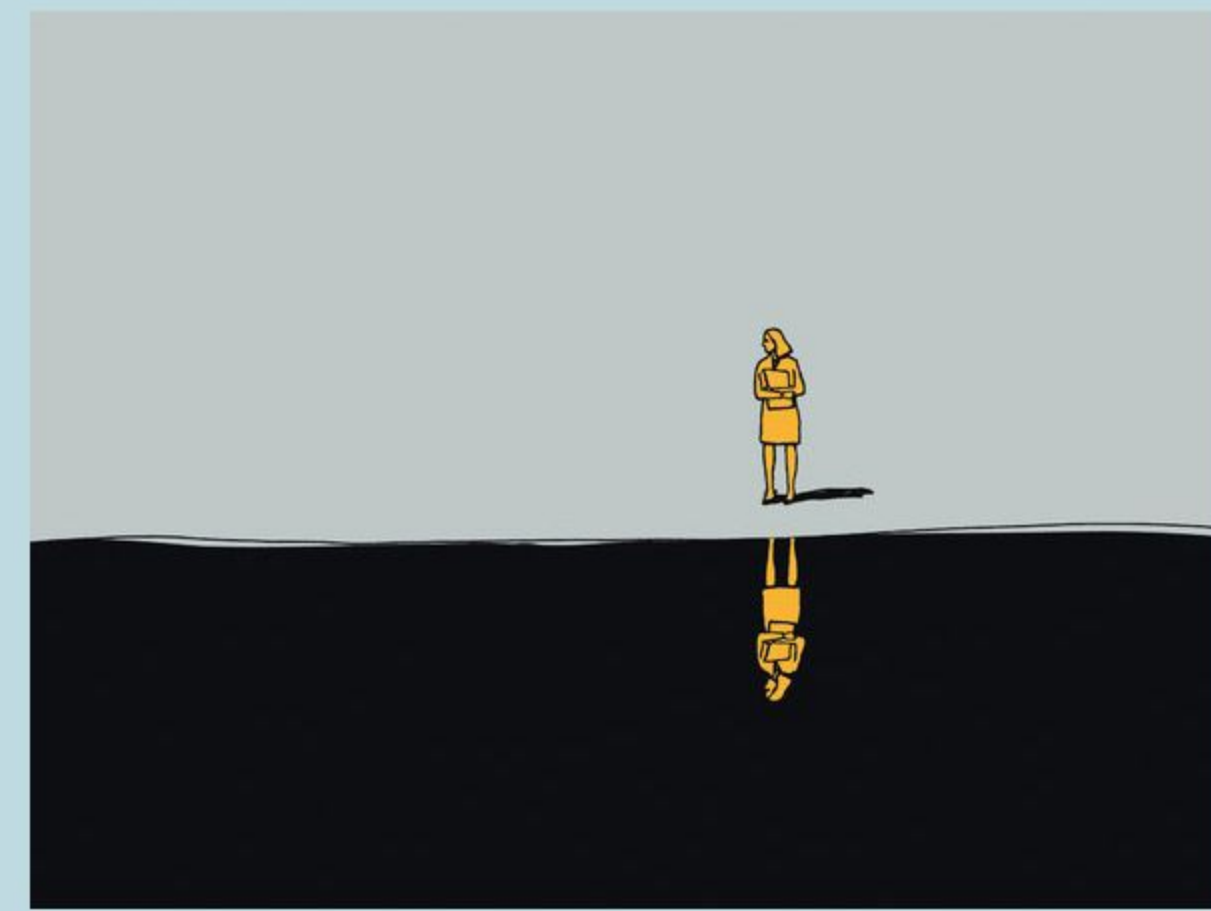


There are few things as pleasurable as a little nighttime adventure in which you get to trash the kitchen. It is squeeze-your-heart charming when Earl turns Buddy's water bowl into a moonlit lake, and Buddy—the clumsy literalist—knocks over the garbage can only to find gold: meatloaf. There are monsters to tend with—hairbrush-eating purses, menacing vacuum cleaners—but better, there are fine sentences with which to wrestle: "It was a spur-of-the-moment decision"; "Wherever the road leads me....However long it takes." Chums Buddy the dog and Earl the hedgehog have had an eventful day and are ready for some slumber. Drawn with spare line work and great blocks of soft, dreamy color in a nighttime palette, the pals' setting appropriately shifts between mundane and extraordinary, just like their adventure. 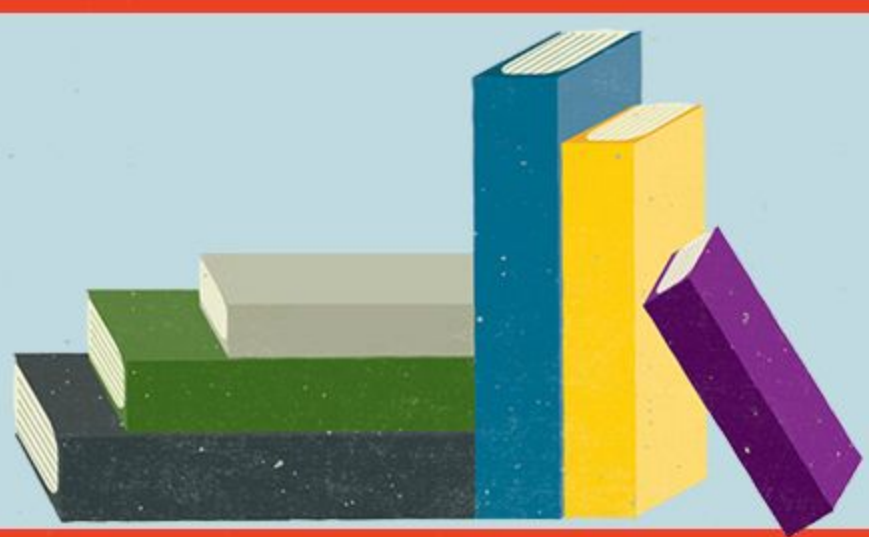

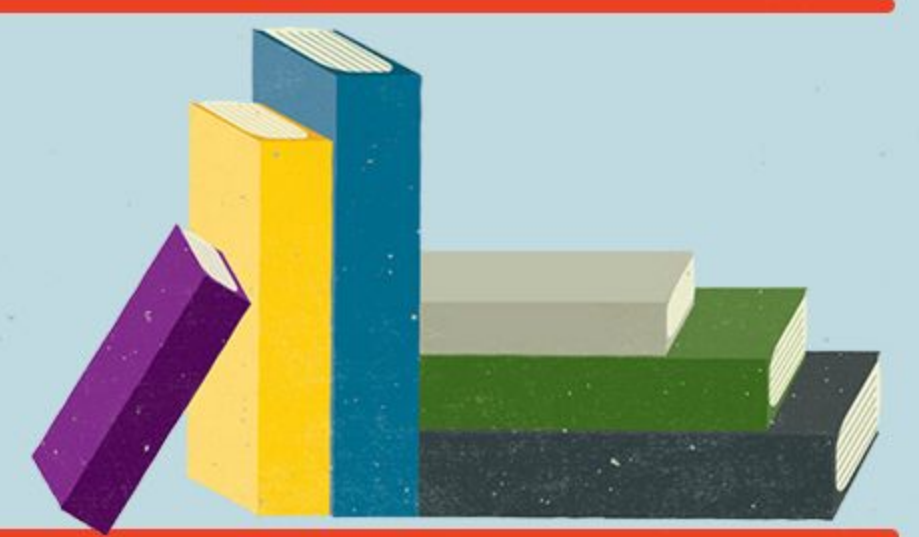
To celebrate National Poetry Month, the library will host poet and artist Laura Minning on Tuesday, April 26th at 6:30pm. Minning was born in Virginia and lived in Georgia and Connecticut before attending college in Massachusetts. She received her Bachelor of Arts degree in Human Studies from Bradford College. Minning has been published in various national anthologies and received two awards in merit for her poetry by The National Library of Poetry, and was granted membership into the International Who's Who in Poetry by Poetry.com. Minning's first published poetry collection, "Dear Diary," was released by Vantage Press in 2003, and her second book, "Sunburst," was published by Xlibris in 2005. Minning has also been published with Slate and Style and Yahoo as a contributing author. More recently, her poetry has been featured in Amulet Literary Magazine, The Tower, Magnets and Ladders, The Sacred Owl, and Random Access Poetics. The event is free and open to the public.

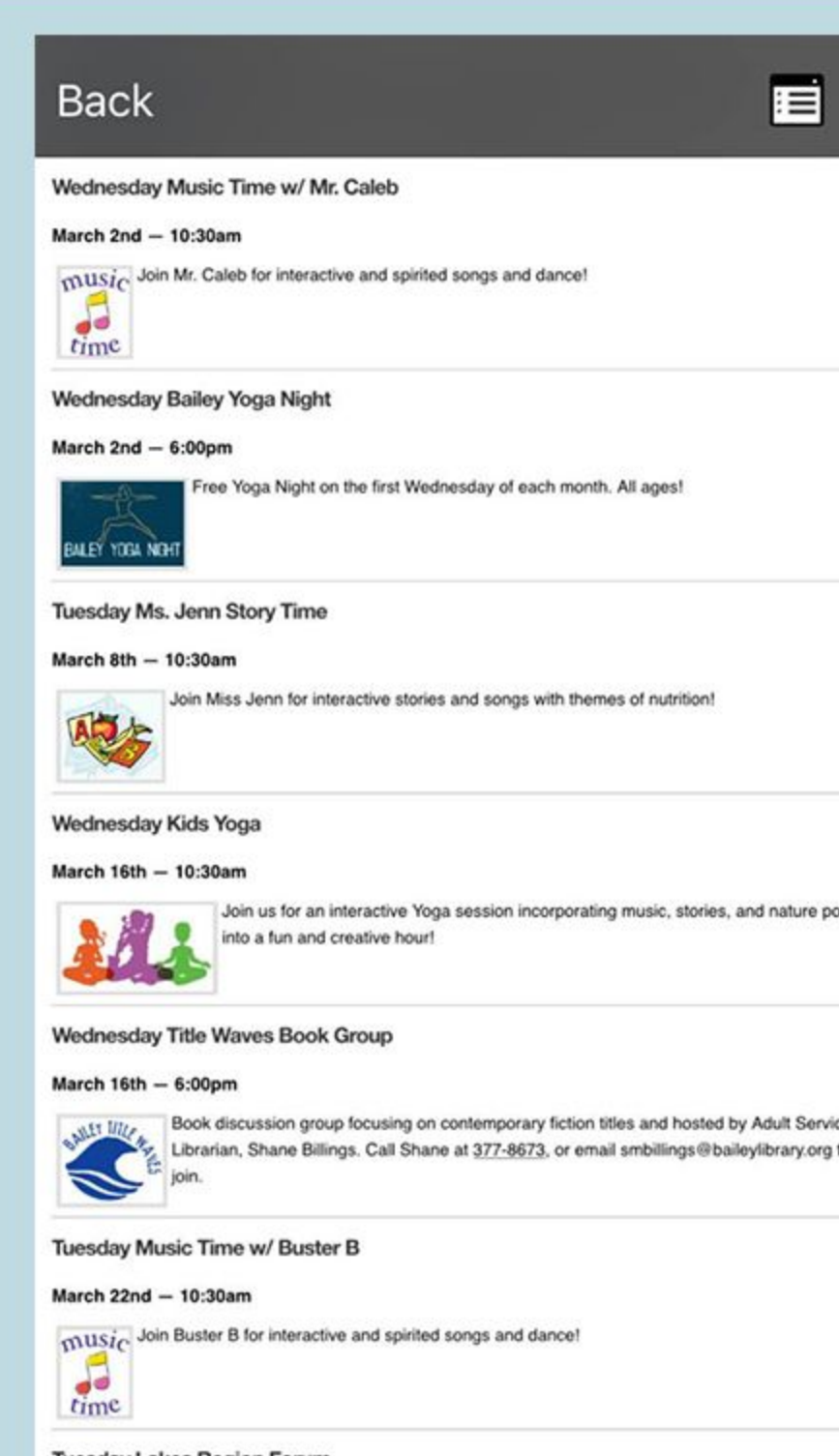
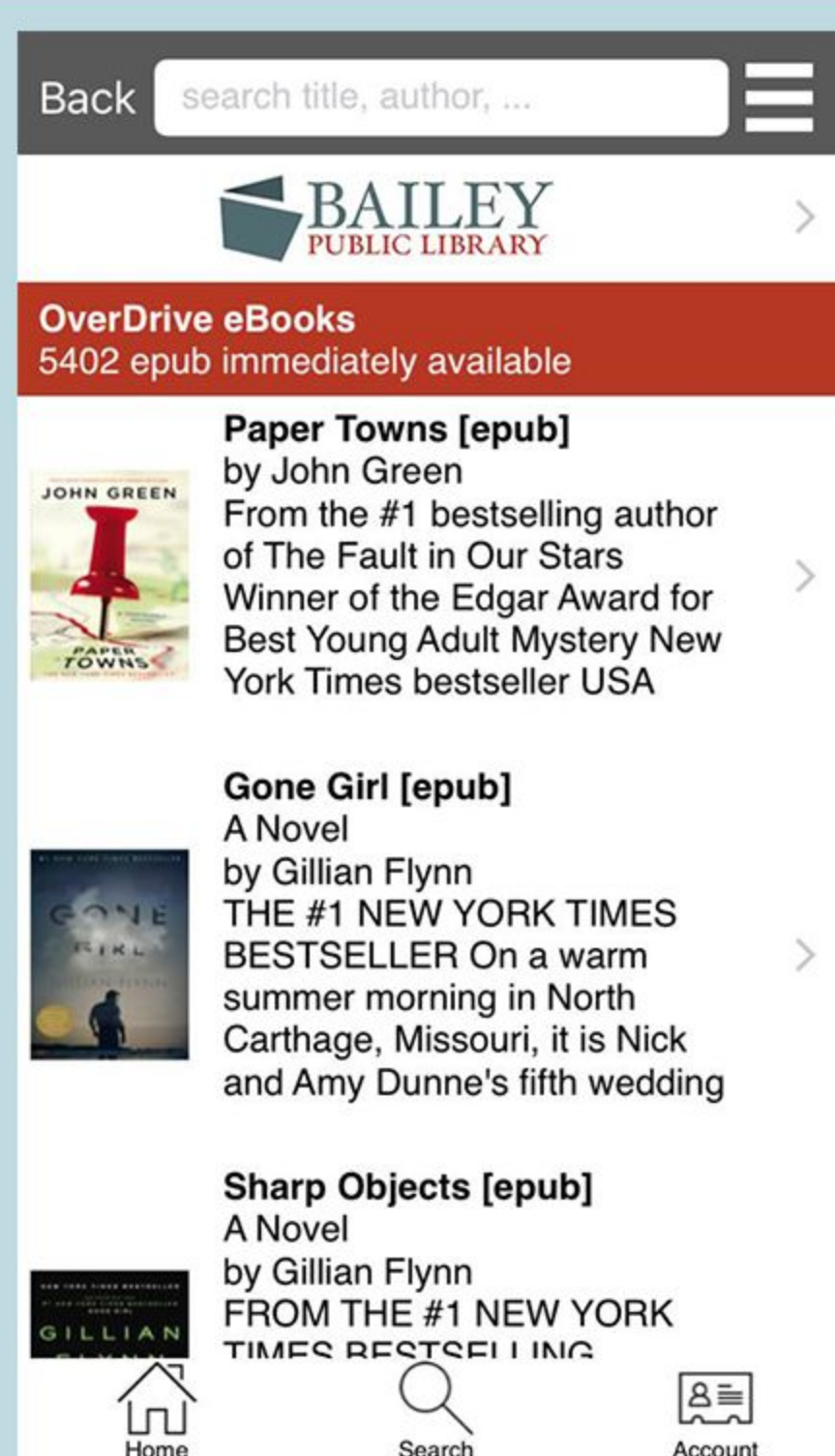
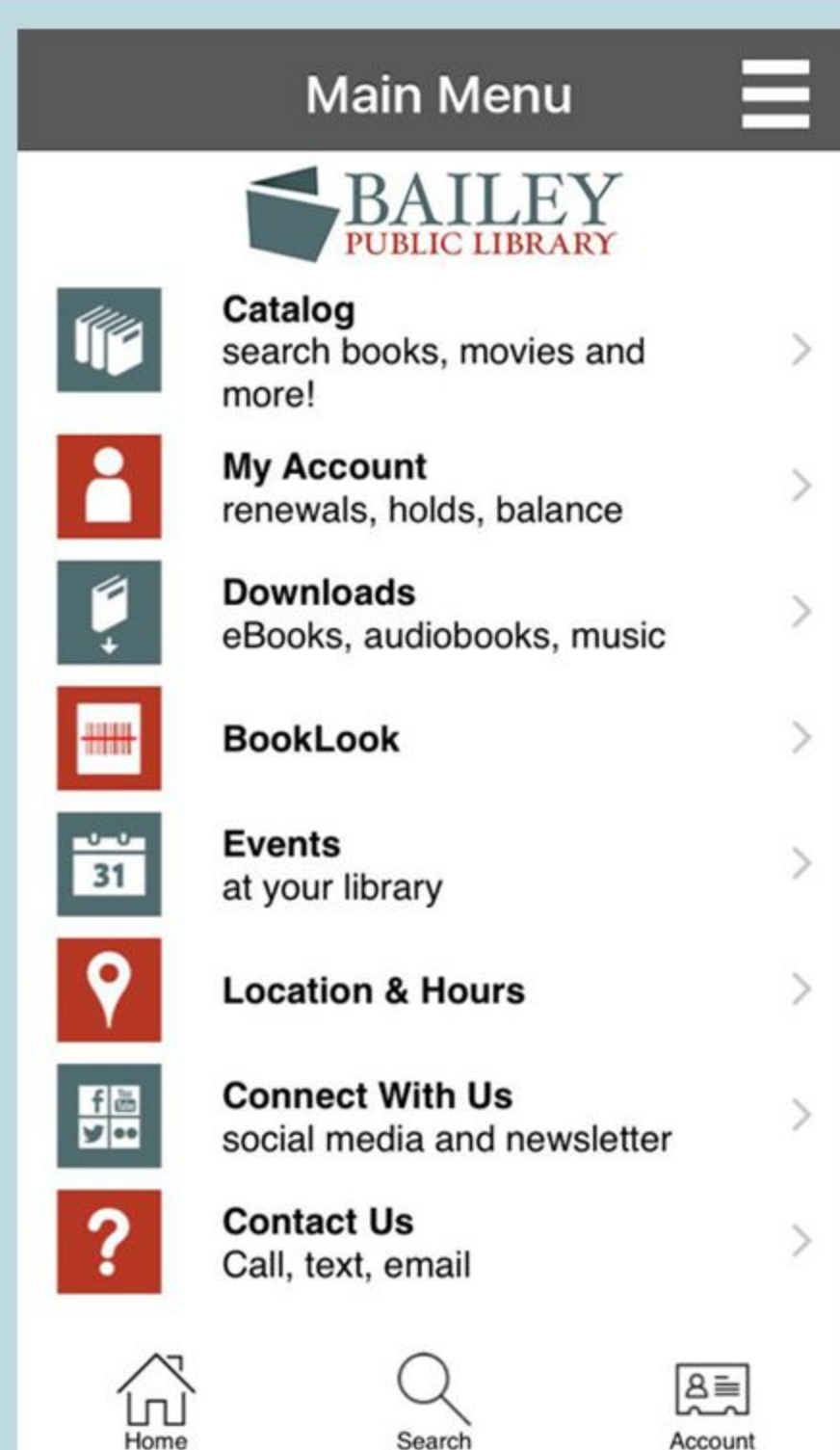
**NEW BOOK AT THE LIBRARY:** Journey to Munich by Jacqueline Winspear

On an undercover mission for the British Secret Service in Nazi Germany, Maisie Dobbs must face not only the horrors of the Third Reich, but very real reminders of her own tragic past. It's 1938, and Maisie is finally back in England following a stint as a nurse in Spain during the Spanish Civil War. Her homeland still holds the ghosts of her former life with her late husband, James, who died in a plane crash. Complicating things is Elaine Otterburn, the woman Maisie blames for James' death. Convinced by the influential Otterburns to persuade the hard-partying Elaine to return home from Munich, Maisie discovers that Elaine may be entangled in something more dangerous than just drinking with the Gestapo. Winspear elegantly balances Maisie's emotional turmoil and dogged patriotism with the growing tensions of a Europe on the brink of war.

Critics Consensus

Adapted by novelist Nick Hornby from a 2009 novel by Colm Tóibín, "Brooklyn" tells the story of Eilis Lacey, who leaves Ireland in 1952 to move to New York, where a priest has a job and a room waiting for her. Eilis is played by Saoirse Ronan, who emerges here as the quietest spellbinder in movies. This is a story of assimilation; of newcomers who aspire to fit in, even as they establish their own ethnic communities. "Brooklyn" has a few arguable missteps, but it is never foolish or excessive; it is calm and civilized and charming, but also emotionally striking. Its consistency of tone and undistracted dedication to Eilis' story are remarkable achievements, and a testimony to the control exercised by Crowley, who has made his best film to date, by far.



# Winthrop Lakes Region Forum: Travis Mills

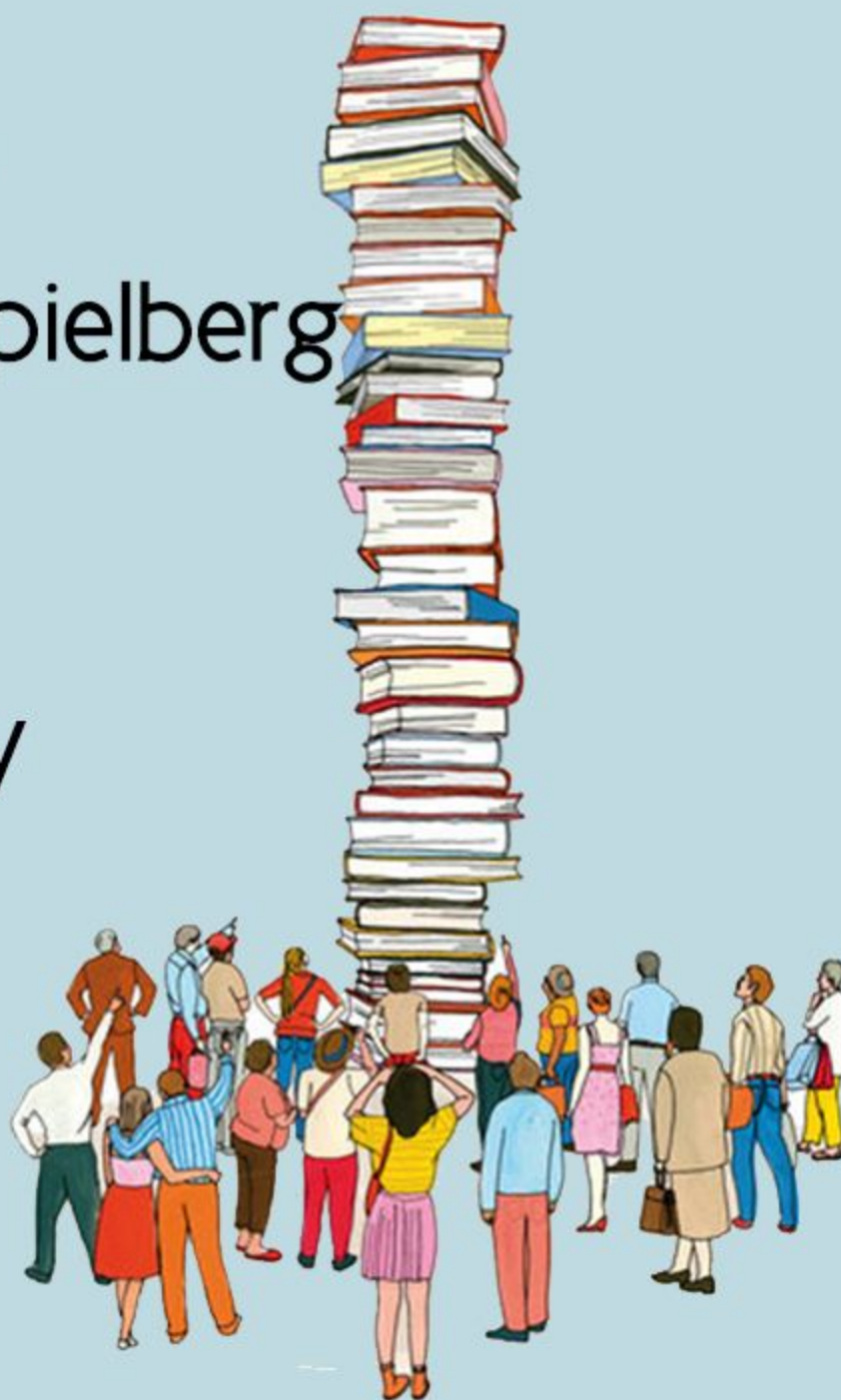


The library will host retired Staff Sergeant Travis Mills on Friday, April 29th at the Winthrop Performing Arts Center. Doors will open at 6:30pm and the event will start at 7:00pm. The event is co-hosted by Winthrop resident Karen Toothaker and cosponsored by American Legion Alfred W Maxwell Jr Post No 40. Tickets will be available at the library beginning the week of April 4th. The program is free and open to the public, but contributions to the Travis Mills Foundation to support The Maine Chance Lodge & Retreat will be collected at the door. Mills has authored a book, "Tough As They Come," and his film, "Travis: A Soldier's Story," was released nationwide in 2014 and includes raw footage from Mills' early days of rehabilitation, as well as interviews with his fellow soldiers, and a reenactment of his April 2012 injury. During his third tour of duty in Afghanistan, he was caught in an IED blast. Mills became one of only five soldiers from the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq to survive a quadruple amputation. The event will feature a talk from Mills in addition to a screening of the film. Mills recently announced that his Foundation has purchased the historic Maine Chance Lodge & Retreat in Rome, and will convert it into housing for disabled veterans and their families. The Lodge was previously owned by cosmetics pioneer Elizabeth Arden, and stars such as Judy Garland and Ava Gardner have passed through its doors. Now, the home will be converted into America's first fully accessible "smart-home" facility to serve combat-wounded veterans and their families.
