## 2016 Summer Deading




Public libraries across Maine are gearing up for summer reading for students of all ages. The Bailey Library will offer events, crafts, and other fun activities to promote the enjoyment of reading. This year's summer reading theme is 'On Your Mark Get Set Read," and the program will run June through August. Studies show that students who do not read during the summer can experience 'summer set-back,' losing ground in learning and returning to school less ready in the fall. In the summer of 2015, over 160 children participated in summer reading at the Bailey Library. We encourage children to read anything they like: books, magazines, comic books, graphic novels, or even audio books on any subject. Pre-readers earn prizes by listening to books read aloud. ### Literary Favorites



#### NEW BOOK AT THE LIBRARY: The Noise of Time by Julian Barnes

A fictional treatment of the Russian composer Shostakovich and his long history of humiliation and persecution under Soviet rule. 'Muddle instead of music,' read the headline in Pravda after the 1936 performance of Shostakovich's opera Lady Macbeth of Mtsensk. Under Stalin's rule, this signified more than just a bad review –it was a loudly broadcasted command to stick to the Communist Party line and, amid purges and gulags, tantamount to a death threat. This brief novel from the Man Booker Prize–winning Barnes captures the cloud of fear the composer lived under until his death. Barnes captures his subject's stress and dark humor with his signature grace. There's plenty of sharp imagery depicting Shostakovich's bind. A moody, muted composition about art under the thumb of tyranny.

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## Debut Novel by Molly Prentiss

NEW BOOK AT THE LIBRARY: Tuesday Nights in 1980



Prentiss' sweeping debut follows three intertwining lives through the swirling energy, burning excitement, and crushing disappointment of New York City's rapidly shifting art world at the dawn of the 1980s. Their stories crash into each other like dominoes—the critic, the artist, and the muse—their separate futures and personal tragedies inextricably linked. The particulars of their connections, romantic and artistic, are too big and too poetic to be entirely plausible, but then, this is not a slice—of—life novel: this is a portrait of an era, an intoxicating Manhattan fairy tale. Prentiss' characters—rich, nuanced, satisfyingly complicated—are informed not only by their emotional lives, but also by their intellectual and artistic ones; their relationships to art are as lively and essential as their relationships to each other. As affecting as it is absorbing. A thrilling debut.


NEW DVD AT THE LIBRARY: The Revenant directed by Alejandro G. Iñárritu



Based on Michael Punke's novel of the same name, 'The Revenant' is a masterclass in naturalistic filmmaking. Every element of action is fully recreated through impeccable audio, lighting, set design and visual effects. Leonardo DiCaprio plays legendary explorer and fur trapper Hugh Glass, who is leading a commercial trapping expedition into Native American controlled territory in what is now Montana and North Dakota. From the painfully wide shots of the lifeless snowy landscape to the plentiful upward angle shots taking in the moving branches of trees, the film looks beautiful, and every part of that beauty works to accentuate the realism of the other aspects of the film. The Revenant is a film meticulously conceived, bringing its story to life in the most truthful and painful way possible.

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# Winthrop Lakes Region Forum: Bill Roorbach



The library will host award-winning novelist and nature writer Bill Roorbach on Tuesday, May 24th at 6:30pm in the King Event Room on the first floor of the downtown library. Roorbach will discuss his newest and much acclaimed novel 'The Remedy for Love,' which Newsday calls '...a page-turner, a love story and a vivid drama of man and woman against the elements.' Bill Roorbach is the author of nine books of fiction and nonfiction, including the bestselling 'Life Among Giants,' a novel that is now under development as a multi-year series on HBO. The 10th anniversary edition of his craft book, 'Writing Life Stories,' is used in writing programs around the world. His work has been published in Harper's, the Atlantic Monthly, the New York Times Magazine, and dozens of other magazines and journals. 'Life Among Giants' was an Editor's Pick for Amazon's Best Books of 2012, and the winner of the Maine Literary Award for Fiction. Previously, Roorbach was the recipient of the prestigious Flannery O'Connor Award for Short Fiction, and O. Henry Award for short stories. Roorbach grew up in Connecticut, attended Ithaca College and Columbia University, and taught at the University of Maine Farmington, Ohio State University, Colby College, and the College of the Holy Cross.
