Friends Book Sale





Friends Paint Night



Literary Favorites




NEW BOOK AT THE LIBRARY: Willnot by James Sallis

From veteran Sallis comes this short, charming novel that's part noir mystery and part small-town slice of life. The story starts fast and portentously, and the book has the form of a suspense novel: there's a bewildering mass grave that must be excavated; a suddenly returned native, a boyhood-coma survivor, who keeps managing to hide in plain sight; a dogged FBI agent; and more. It also has a talky, noirish tone, with lots of snappy patter and sharp, laconic, philosophical observation. But at its core, and satisfyingly, this turns out to be a character-driven novel about a thoroughly thoughtful, decent, compassionate doctor, and his community of colleagues, patients, friends, and acquaintances. A brisk and sure-handed treat.

The One-in-a-Million-Boy by Monica Wood

Monica Wood has returned to fiction after the amazing success of her nonfiction masterpiece, "When We Were the Kennedys." The-One-in-a-Million Boy is an absolute gem. Wood has created a most memorable protagonist in the 104 year old Ona Vitkus, whose visits from a list-obsessed Boy Scout prompt her to go for an entry in the Guinness Book of World Records as the world's oldest licensed driver. From this appealing premise, however, Wood creates a touching story of unexpected death. There are so many things to praise about The-One-in-a-Million-Boy, but chief among them are the slow building friendship between Ona and the boy's father, Quinn; a charming cast of supporting players; and the deft mix of humor and poignancy that Wood sprinkles over her narrative. At times funny, often heartwarming, and always graceful, this novel is further proof that Wood is among our finest writers.

Summer Pick By Shane M. Billings

Tuesday Nights in 1980 by Molly Prentiss explores the downtown art scene in New York City at the dawn of the 1980s. Three primary characters are given the spotlight: James Bennett, an art critic; Raul Engales, a painter from Argentina; and Lucy Olliason, a girl from the Midwest who has just moved to the city. Prentiss presents each of their back stories in just the right amount of space, allowing for impressive character development and a sense of history, without slowing down the plot. The details of James's rare sensory condition, which enables him to view art in a most unique way, are fascinating. Raul's love for his sister back in Argentina makes for some perfectly understated, yet poignant moments. Lucy emerges as a fully realized, complex and flawed character. The manner in which all three of their stories intertwine proves that Prentiss can structure a great plot as well as wonderful characters. Overall, a fantastic debut novel.

Winthrop Lakes Region Forum: Craiq Hickman



The library will host local farmer and award-winning writer Craig Hickman on Tuesday, July 19th at 6:30pm. Hickman will give a biographical talk about growing up an adopted son in Wisconsin, discovering his roots, farming in Maine, and serving in the Maine legislature. In addition, Hickman will share poems and writing excerpts from his popular books, including the bestselling "Fumbling Toward Divinity." Hickman received his bachelor's degree from Harvard University, and is the recipient of the Massachusetts Cultural Council Artist Grant, the James Baldwin Award for Cultural Achievement, and the Gertrude Johnson Williams Literary Award. Hickman also wrote one of the top-ranked independent sports blogs on the internet for the Huffington Post. His solo performances, "Skin & Ornaments" and "Portraits of a Black Queen," have been staged across the USA. He appeared as himself in the feature film "Never Met Picasso," starring Alexis Arquette. Hickman operates the historic 25-acre Annabessacook Farm, a bed and breakfast and sustainable farm that raises and sells organic produce, dairy and livestock. Originally from Milwaukee, Hickman moved to New England in 1986. The Winthrop Lakes Region Forum is made possible by support from the Winthrop Public Library Foundation and the Town of Winthrop.
