

NEW BOOK AT THE LIBRARY: The Grasshopper & the Ants by Jerry Pinkney



Caldecott Medalist Pinkney returns to Aesop, recasting the familiar fable as a meditation on the importance of sustaining both body and soul. As industrious ants ferry seeds and leaves to their colony throughout spring, summer and fall, Grasshopper bug band with banjo, drum kit and concertina—fishes, frolics and plays. Pinkney's four—season watercolor palette is more vibrant than ever. Grasshopper's iridescent wings contrast with his scarlet instruments; the ants' earth—brown bodies anchor spreads brimming with lush flowers or whirling autumn leaves. Pinkney's delightfully forthright artist's note identifies Grasshopper as 'an artist in his own right.' Acknowledging liberties taken with the ants' size, he



NEW BOOK AT THE LIBRARY: The Green Road by Anne Enright


Newly chosen as Ireland's first fiction laureate, Enright showcases the skill that underpins her success and popularity in this story of place and connection. Long introductions to the principal characters precede the theatrical format of the reunion, allowing Enright plenty of space to convey her brilliant ear for dialogue, her soft wit, and piercing, poetic sense of life's larger abstractions. Like Enright's Man Booker Prize-winning "The Gathering," this novel traces experience across generations although, despite a brief crisis, this is a less dramatic story, while abidingly generous and humane.

NEW BOOK AT THE LIBRARY: Rise by Karen Campbell


A young woman on the run from a vicious pursuer, a troubled marriage, a man tormented by a sneering ghost, and the fight to save a sacred landscape from development are the ingredients in a Scottish author's impressive U.S. debut. Written in striking, often imaginative prose yet paced as immediately as a thriller, Campbell's novel hits the ground running as Justine Strang flees Glasgow on a bus to anywhere, with a stash of stolen money stuffed in her clothes. Campbell's deft



handling of a busy plot is marked by wit and a strong commitment to the Scottishness of her material, reflected in the language (trauchle/crannogs/smirred/etc) and her obvious love for Kilmacarra's history and landscape. There are soft spots, including a caricatured Spanish businessman and a convenient love interest, but little hinders the gathering force of the storytelling, with its ground-shifting dash to the finish line.

An engaging writer introduces herself with this fresh, intelligent entertainment, full of satisfying moving parts.

NEW DVD AT THE LIBRARY:
Rosewater directed by Jon Stewart

'Rosewater' is the gripping, intelligent directorial debut of TV personality Jon Stewart, who also wrote the screenplay, based on Bahari's post-prison memoir, 'Then They Came For Me.' The film begins with Bahari's arrest before flashing back to cover the week and a half leading up to his internment. Once he's in Tehran's notorious Evin prison, and under the harsh control of Rosewater, it's obvious that Bahari is in for an ordeal. Stewart's film showcases political corruption and a tonally daring, sometimes thoughtfully conceived look at an unusual story that's only five years old and mostly unknown.

Lakes Region Forum: Richard Blanco



Richard Blanco, the poet best known for writing and reciting the inaugural poem 'One Today' for President Obama's 2013 inauguration, will give a reading and lecture on Tuesday, August 25 at 6:30pm. The event is free and open to the public, but tickets are required and must be picked up in person at the library.

Two years ago, Blanco received a rare honor: an invitation from the Obama administration to serve as inaugural poet at the president's 2013 inauguration. The administration chose "One Today," in which Blanco concentrated on the commonalities among Americans. As inaugural poet, Blanco followed in the footsteps of American poetry giants such as Robert Frost and Maya Angelou. The choice of Blanco as inaugural poet was full of firsts: 44 at the time, he was the youngest of the five poets, as well as the first Latino and openly gay man ever to serve in that capacity.

In an interview with Terry Gross for NPR, Blanco described how writing the inauguration poem differed from his typical writing process. "One of the hardest challenges of the poem itself overall was how to, at once, put myself in there, but realizing that this poem isn't about me, it's about our country." Blanco's newest book "The Prince of los Cocuyos" is a coming of age memoir about growing up as the child of Cuban immigrants in Miami, and his family's struggle to retain its cultural heritage, while cultivating its American identity. Oprah Magazine described the book as "vibrant" and "exhilarating."

Born in Madrid to exiled Cuban parents, Blanco and his family moved to New York City while he was an infant and then to Miami, where he grew up in a close-knit Cuban community. Four years later, the family settled in Westchester, a Miami suburb west of Little Havana, on what was then the western fringe of the city. "Westchester felt like a kind of cultural purgatory, a waiting place caught between the real-imagined America and the real-imagined Cuba," he writes in his 2013 memoir "For All of Us, One Today."

Blanco has become an award winning and renowned public speaker since his inaugural reading, speaking to the U.S. Federal Reserve and Department of Agriculture, and has been chosen as keynote speaker at numerous art summits, literary events, and universities across the country. Blanco, who received honorary degrees from Colby College and the Maine College of Art in 2014, now lives with his partner in Bethel, Maine.
