NEW BOOK COMING SOON: Nutshell by Ian McEwan

McEwan's latest novel is short, smart, and narrated by an unborn baby. The narrator describes himself upside down in his mother's womb, arms crossed, doing slow motion somersaults, almost full-term, wondering about the future. His mother listens to the radio, audiobooks, and podcasts, so just from listening he has acquired knowledge of current events, music, literature, and history. The novel is laced with linguistic deception, cultural references, and insights into human ingenuity and pettiness. Packed with humor and tinged with suspense, this gem resembles a sonnet the narrator recalls hearing his father recite: brief, dense, bitter, suggestive of unrequited and unmanageable longing, surprising, and surprisingly affecting.

A comic-book riff on the classic tale of 'Jack and the Beanstalk,' in which a young boy learns that his new garden has a mind of its own. Jack certainly doesn't have an easy life: with past-due notices piling up, his mother works all the time, leaving him to care for his autistic sister, Maddy. One fateful day at a flea market, he happens upon a vendor who offers him a mysterious box of seeds in exchange for his mother's car. Maddy and Jack accept his deal and quickly discover that these seeds are anything but ordinary. Joined by his home-schooled neighbor Lilly, the children spend their summer learning the quirks and magic of the garden until they unearth an evil lurking within. Hatke is a master visual storyteller; through sparse, carefully chosen text, his largely image-based story enthralls from one action-packed panel to the next. His interpretation of the familiar fairy tale is richly imagined. His first in a series flourishes up to its nail-biting cliffhanger. Very mighty indeed.


The Danish Girl directed by Tom Hooper



Based on David Ebershoff's novel of the same name and inspired by the lives of painters Lili Elbe and Gerda Wegener, 'The Danish Girl' is a gorgeously cinematic film about love in its purest form. Eddie Redmayne plays Lili Elbe, who we first meet in the film as Einar Wegener, a celebrated landscape artist in 1926 Copenhagen, while Alicia Vikander plays Gerda Wegener, the wife of Einar. Gerda is also an artist as a portrait painter, but lives in her celebrated husband's shadow. The role of Gerda is brilliantly defined and Vikander delivers an incredible range of emotions, from brave–faced supporter to soul–crushing despair. Director Tom Hooper frames nearly every shot as if he were painting his scenes and finding the just–right light and character of the situation to inspire him into picking up his brush.

Winthrop Lakes Region Forum: Monica Wood



Nationally acclaimed Maine writer Monica Wood will be speaking at the library on Tuesday, August 2nd at 6:30pm. Wood will discuss her much acclaimed new novel "The One-in-a-Million Boy," which The Guardian describes as 'exquisitely crafted.' Monica Wood is also the author of "When We Were the Kennedys," the nationally renowned bestseller that recounts Wood's Catholic upbringing, the death of her father when she was in the fourth grade and life in a mill town during labor unrest. Her novel "Any Bitter Thing" was a Book Sense Top Ten pick. Wood's other fiction includes "Ernie's Ark" and "My Only Story," a finalist for the Kate Chopin Award. Her first play, "Papermaker," based on "Ernie's Ark," takes place in Maine, and is about two families who collide during a strike at the local paper mill. The play recently finished a successful 5-week run at the Portland Stage Company. Wood was born in Mexico, Maine, to a family of paper mill workers. She has had a successful 30-year career as a writer of all things Maine, and for the past 40 years, she's lived in the same house in the Nasons Corner neighborhood of Portland. Copies of Wood's books will be available for sale at the event, and a book signing will follow the program.
