



Two Nearly Perfect Novels

Beloved by Toni Morrison

Beloved won the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction, and although it's not my favorite Morrison novel (that would be Sula), it's certainly her masterpiece as well as one of the most important literary works of all time. Morrison's prose is exquisite, which makes reading her books pure joy. If she was simply writing nonsense, the pleasure would still be all ours. However, she weaves spellbinding plots and develops unforgettable characters, so really, there is nothing to criticize. Beloved is powerful, and it's definitely the darkest of her novels, a tale that makes the abomination of slavery crystal clear by focusing on its victims. The brutal sacrifice that one victim makes to free her child from slavery's grip will devastate and enlighten the reader. Deserving of every honor heaped upon it

Atonement by Ian McEwan

With Atonement, Ian McEwan crafted a story so riveting, well-plotted, and ultimately surprising that the book deserves multiple rereads to grasp the full effect. Briony Tallis is one of the most annoying characters I've ever encountered, based on her actions, but she is one of the most well-developed, interesting, and somehow authentic as well. She is bound to elicit some kind of strong response, whether hatred or sympathy. The words employed in this masterpiece are perfect; the language is strikingly beautiful without weighing things down. The middle passages of the book, which go into detail about Robbie's years in the war and Briony's stint as a nurse (part of her penance or atonement), never drag. The ending is one of the best and most unexpected I've ever read, and I cannot recommend this book highly enough.
