In the age of social networking sites like Facebook and Twitter, there is a place readers can converge for their own information exchange. Goodreads.com is a social networking site for readers, which first appeared in December 2006. Since then, the number of users and features has grown steadily.

To register as a member on Goodreads, you simply need an email address, and signing up is quick and easy. Once you're on board, you can create a personal profile and even add a picture. Then, the world of books is at your fingertips.

Goodreads allows you to catalog books that you have read, books you are currently reading, and even books that you want to read. You're also able to rate books on a star system, from one (didn't like it) to five (it was amazing). In addition to the ratings, you can write book reviews, which other users can then comment on.

How many times have you scratched your head, wondering whether you've read a particular title by Patricia Cornwell or David Baldacci? Goodreads offers an alternative to recording book titles in a journal.

Perhaps most importantly, the site serves as a venue for literary discussion, allowing you to express your thoughts on a book and read what others have to say. A great feature called "Listopia" includes all sorts of lists, ranging from the "best" reads in any given genre, to the greatest works by a particular author. At the end of each year, all members of Goodreads are able to vote for the Goodreads Choice Awards in several different categories. Last year's overall winner was *Room* by Emma Donoghue.
