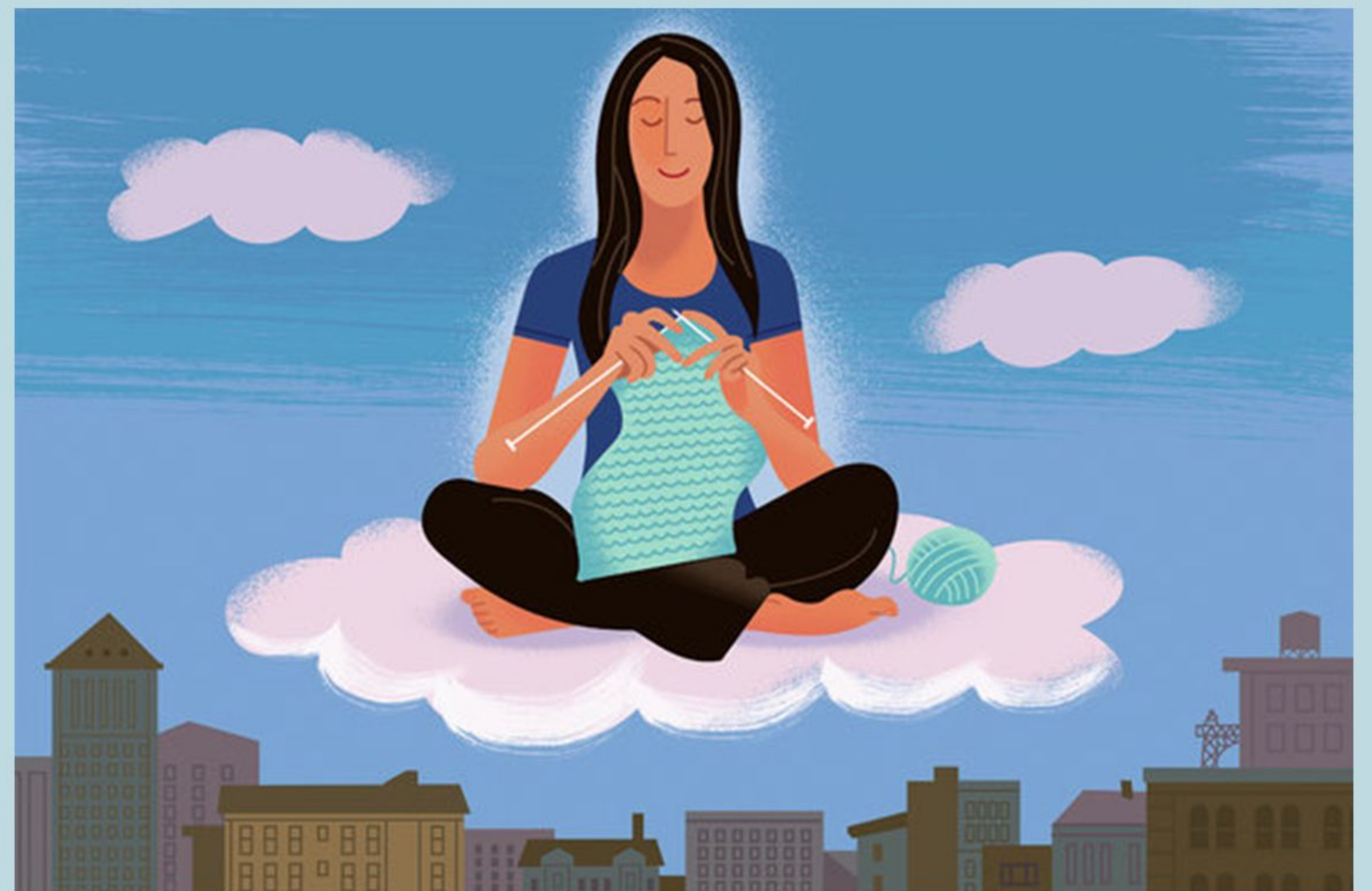

Bailey Yoga Night Returns!

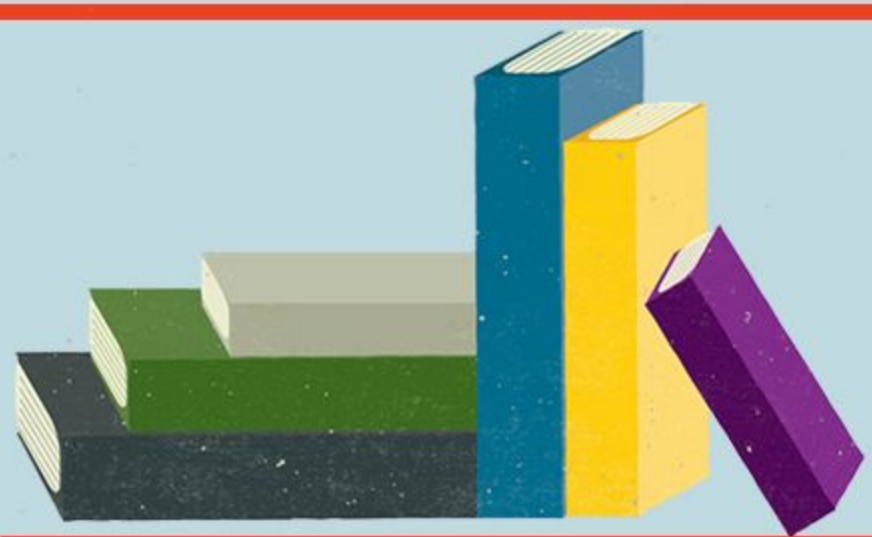

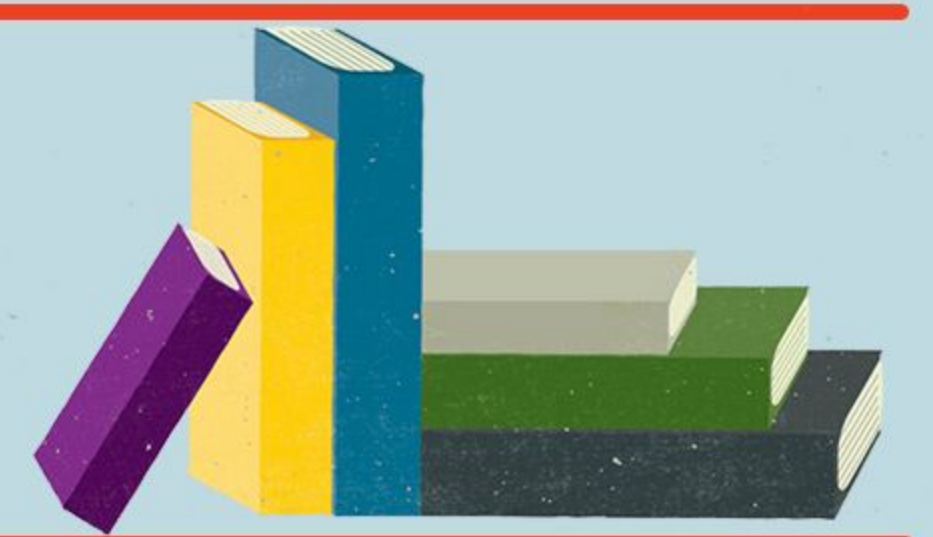
Knitting Group!

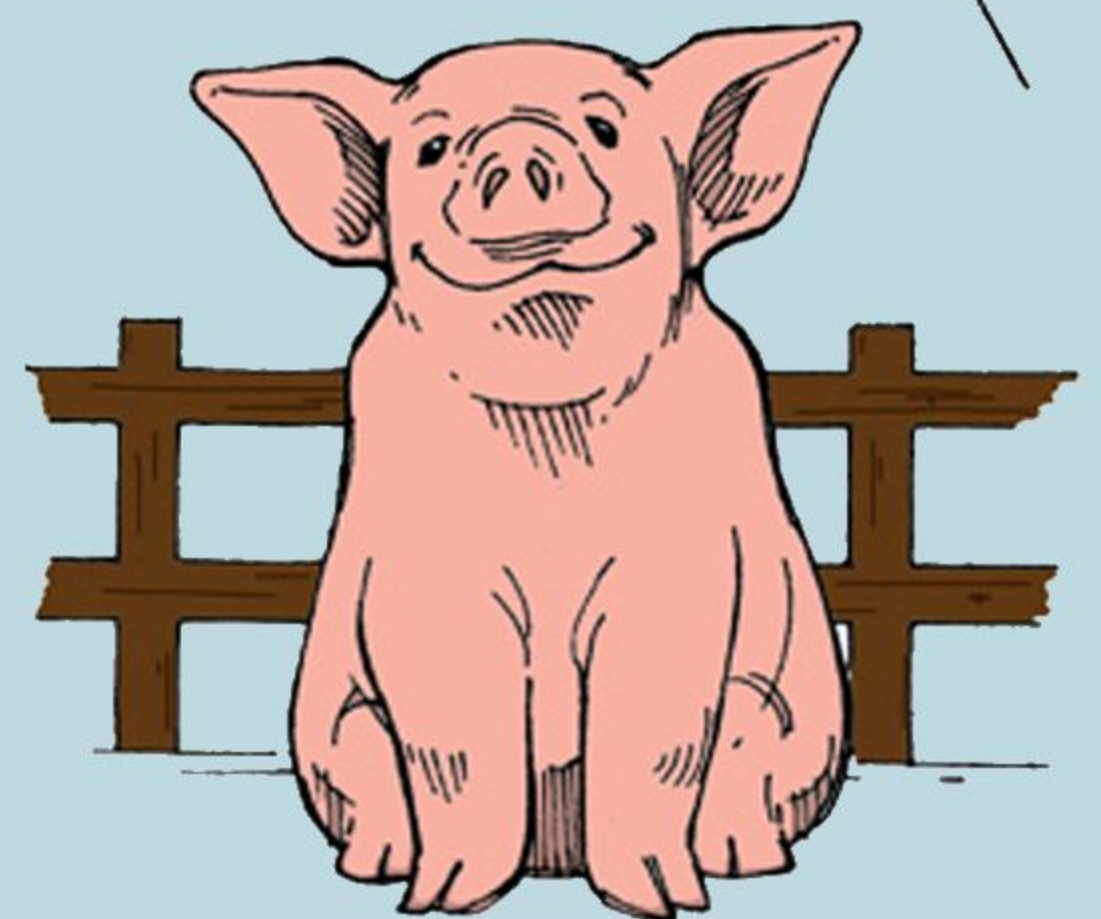
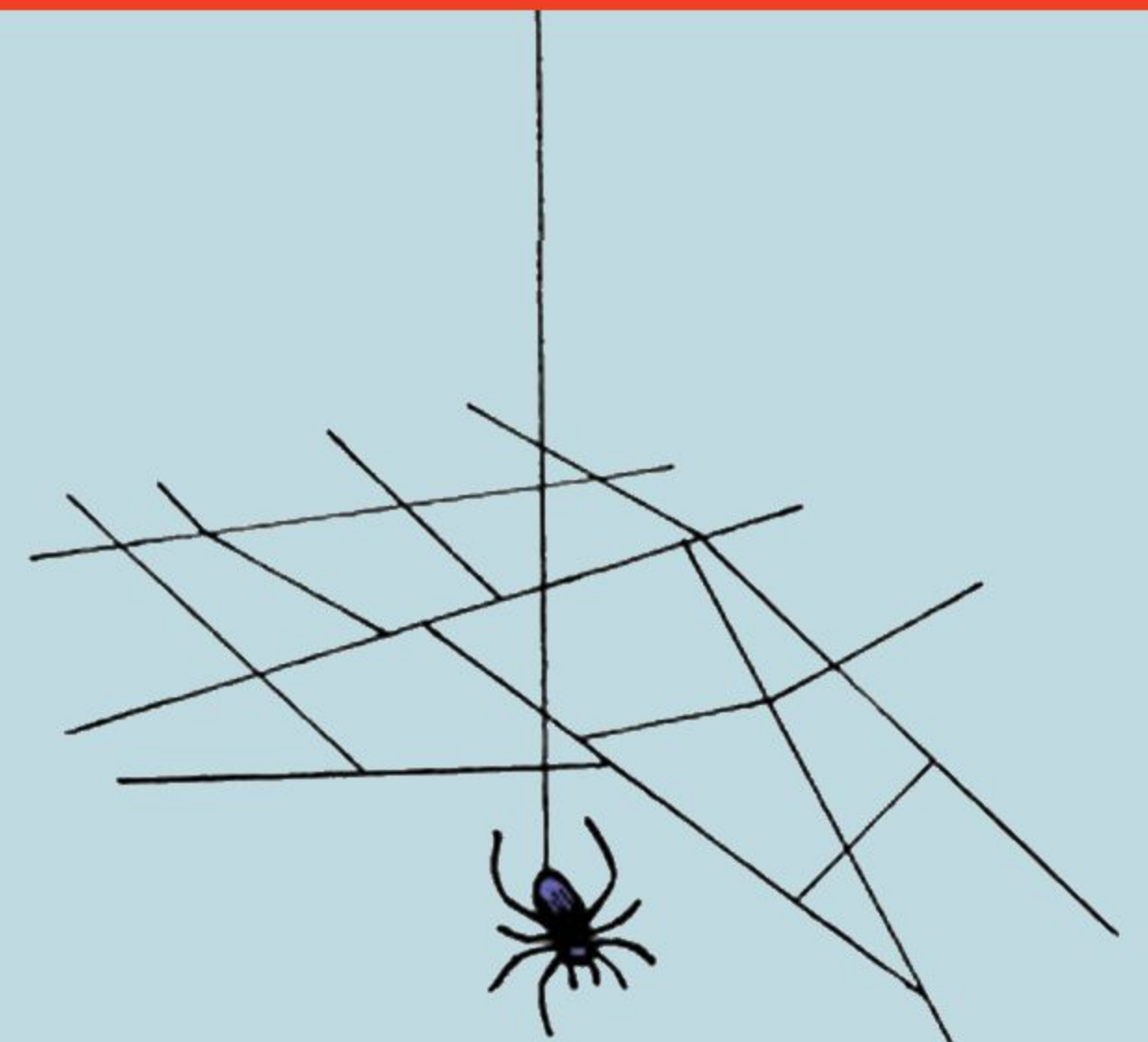


NEW BOOK COMING SOON: Elevation by Stephen King

King revisits a couple of familiar themes while paying heed to new realities in this elegant whisper of a story. Set in Castle Rock, Maine, "Elevation" is a moving story about a man named Scott Carey whose mysterious affliction brings a small town together. King delivers an uncharacteristically slim novel, just a hair longer than a novella, and one wishes there were just a little more backstory to give depth to Scott's good-guyness. Why is his reaching out to beleaguered neighbors important in "Trumpian" times? "It just is," Scott tells us, before he finds a memorable--and quite beautiful way to depart a Podunk town - made all the better for his presence. A touching fable with a couple of deft political jabs on the way to showing that it might just be possible for us all to get along.

Critics Consensus

Based on the play of the same name by Anton Chekhov, "The Seagull" is a film that is simultaneously familiar and evocative. The film primarily follows four characters whose paths run parallel and then jumble together, forming unwieldy relationships that eventually lead to ruin. The casting is exquisite, and the performances are equal to the themes of class warfare, artistic defiance, and familial disappointment in Chekhov's play. The Seagull ends in a shattering way, but is such an engrossing watch because Chekhov's work more than a century ago explored questions that we still consider in nearly every form of pop culture today. The film is an experiment in tone that makes its source material a bit more digestible, a lot funnier, and, still, just as tragic.

Lakes Region Forum: Chris Myers Asch



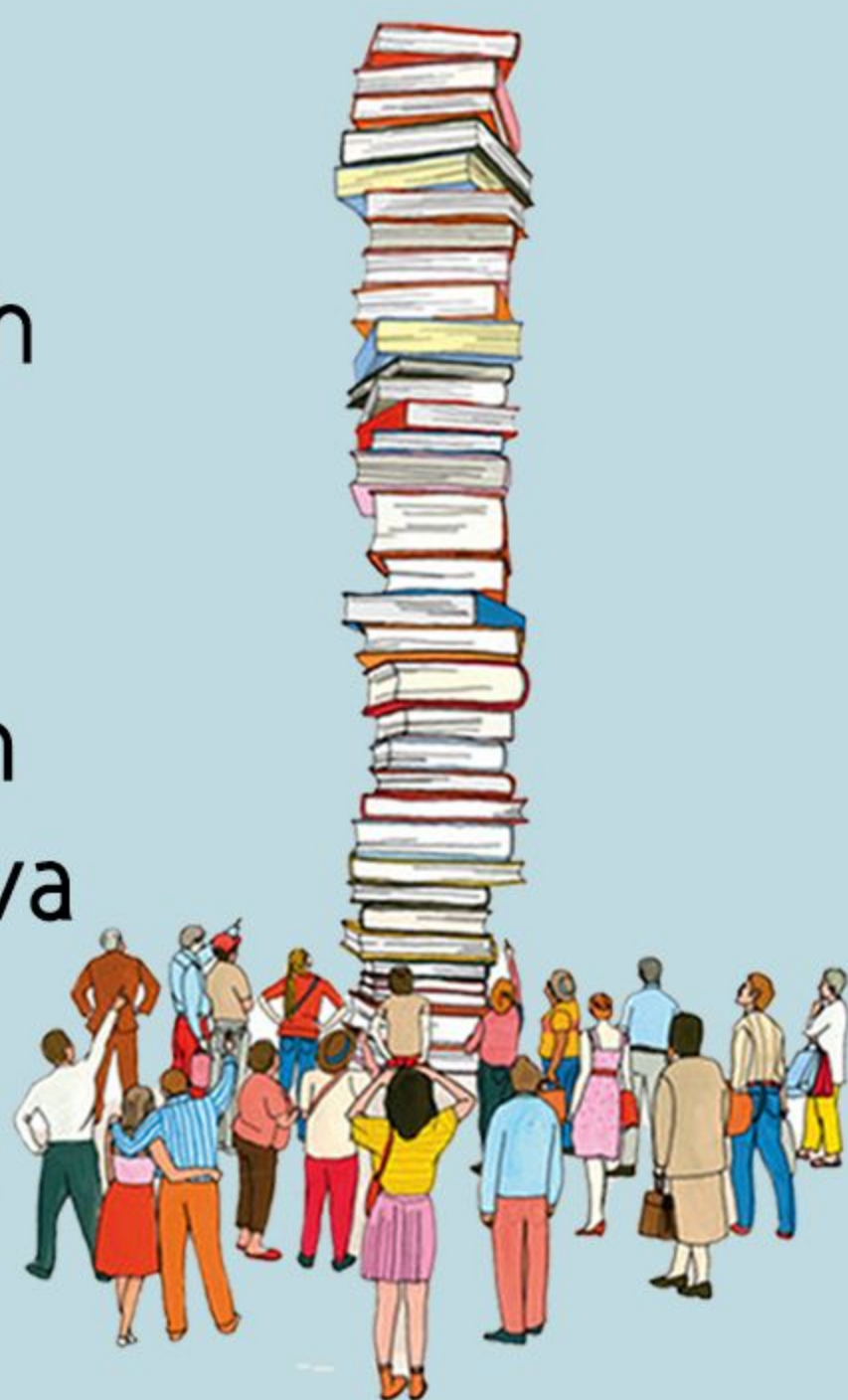
The library will host historian and author Chris Myers Asch on Tuesday, October 23rd at 6:30pm. The event is part of the ongoing Winthrop Lakes Region Forum and is sponsored by the Winthrop Public Library Foundation. Asch will read from and discuss his new book "Chocolate City," which tells the story of race and democracy in our nation's capital. Asch highlights the history of local activism in Washington, D.C., and traces D.C.'s transformations from a sparsely inhabited plantation society into a diverse metropolis, from a center of the slave trade to the nation's first black-majority city.

Chris Myers Asch moved to Maine in 2013 from his hometown of Washington, D.C. when his wife became rabbi of Temple Beth El in Augusta. A graduate of Duke University with a Ph.D. in American History from the University of North Carolina, he is an alumnus of Teach For America and an Echoing Green Fellow. He co-founded the Sunflower County Freedom Project in 1998, the U.S. Public Service Academy initiative in 2006, and the Capital Area New Mainers Project in 2017. Asch teaches history at Colby College, and his new book "Chocolate City: A History of Race and Democracy in the Nation's Capital" was released through The University of North Carolina Press. He and his wife, Erica, have three children and live in Hallowell. The event is free and open to the public.
